During 2022, Arizona AEYC secured a total of \$1,087,500 in grant funding in collaboration with community partners to support projects between 2022-2024 including professional development, early childhood advocacy, and resources to help child care providers save time and money and improve quality.

Nearly 40% (or 2/5) of our 2022 budget went directly to early childhood professionals through training stipends, scholarships, professional development resources, technology access, support for conference expenses, and early learning supplies.

# **OPERATIONS & FINANCIALS**

Transparency in Our Operations: Our 2022 operating budget was \$544,897. About 1/2 of the expenses were pass-through funds for collaborative partnerships and funds to directly support early childhood professionals.

Compensation: We commit to paying our staff a worthy wage of at least \$25 per hour, compensate staff for all hours worked including paid professional development time, and do not allow unpaid labor. We also continue to seek public investments that will ensure that all early childhood professionals earn competitive salaries and benefits commensurate with the complex, important work they do.



# STORIES FROM THE FIELD



Preschool educator Cynthia Rush explores mirrors and natural materials with children in an NAEYC-accredited early learning program.

Our signature "Stories from the Field" initiative lifts up the experiences and voices of early childhood educators and showcases the importance and impact of early care and education in local communities.

In 2022, we published 8 interviews and video clips featuring Arizona early childhood educators. The majority of these stories elevated the voices of Black, Latine, and Indigenous educators and those who have been marginalized.

# Meet Kara Begaye: Diné Early Childhood Educator

Kara Begaye comes from a family of educators and works as a preschool educator at Dilcon Community School on the Navajo Nation – the same school she and her siblings attended. In our Stories from the Field interview, Kara shares her family's history in education, describes her experience as an early childhood education student, and gives advice for other early care and education providers.

Each year during the annual <u>NAEYC Week of the Young</u> <u>Child®</u> (WOYC), Arizona AEYC amplifies the essential work of the early childhood workforce. This year, we highlighted stories that represented <u>children's rights</u> to joy, quality early learning, and equity and <u>teachers' rights</u> to worthy wages for the complex work they do — among many other rights. We collaborated again this year with First Things First, SAZAEYC, and other community partners to celebrate.

In 2022, we featured an interview with a Head Start parent, the learning journey of a first time mom, an early childhood student's goals for advancing research on evidence-based practices for Indigenous children with disabilities, and our first ever Spanish publication with a family child care provider.

# **WEEK OF THE YOUNG CHILD**

AzAEYC's WOYC Facebook posts reached 8,000 people in just a week! On Twitter, there were 3,324 impressions.

More than 25 proclamations were signed by local, state, and tribal elected officials including the Governor.

The proclamations highlighted WOYC and the rights of children, families, and educators to equitable early childhood education and urged public investments to improve access to quality child care.

# **EARLY CHILDHOOD SCHOLARSHIPS**

Annually, we award the "Honor the Past & Reimagine the Future" <u>Early Childhood Scholarship</u> to Arizona college students studying early childhood education with an interest in equitable early learning experiences, public policy, and advocacy efforts on behalf of young children and families. # **EARLY CHILDHOOD ADVOCACY**

Arizona AEYC is the leading advocacy voice for children, families, and the early childhood profession in Arizona. We provide training and technical assistance to develop the advocacy skills of educators and parents and strengthen their voices as champions for children. We also facilitate meetings with state and federal elected officials to secure public investments in child care.

13 legislator meetings

Held 13 meetings with U.S. Congressional Representatives and state legislators in 2022 to advocate for emergency support for child care and significant, sustained public investments in ECE.

150+

Provided advocacy training and support for more than 150 participants in 2022. Sessions focused on how to connect with lawmakers and strategies for increasing public awareness around the importance of child care.

\$8B investment

Activated champions through grassroots engagement to advocate with elected officials. This resulted in an \$8 billion federal investment in the Child Care & Development Block Grant (30% more than 2022) plus increased awareness around the challenges child care faced during the pandemic.

# PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

We provide professional development for educators, administrators, parents, and community champions. Topics include early childhood leadership, building stronger business practices through AZToolkit, and diversity and inclusion.

In 2022, Arizona AEYC was awarded a grant from state federal relief funds to facilitate 5 communities of practice on the new NAEYC *Developmentally Appropriate Practices* book using the <u>Project ECHO®</u> virtual model which is designed to increase equitable access to quality professional development and build knowledge by leveraging the strengths of local communities. Participating child care sites receive 18.5 hours of professional development, NAEYC memberships for all staff, educator books, classroom materials, and stipends for paid professional learning time.

Arizona AEYC has three chapters in our service region that engage educators and the community through local, grassroots activities.

Valley of the Sun Chapter of Arizona AEYC is a 501(c)(3) non-profit that was incorporated in 1974 with the mission of serving children, families, and educators in Maricopa County. In 2017, Valley of the Sun became a chapter of Arizona AEYC and supports the early childhood profession through two signature projects:

- **Light That Fire** professional development sessions for new early childhood educators and Career & Technical Education (CTE) students focused on building leadership skills and professional connections.
- Flip This Playground which installs outdoor libraries, unique gardens, music centers, and outdoor learning spaces at Title I preschools and within communities for families in low-income households.


### **OUR CHAPTERS**

The Northern Chapter of Arizona AEYC serves Apache, Coconino, Mohave, Navajo, and Yavapai Counties.

In 2022, the Northern Chapter provided NAEYC memberships to students in early childhood degree programs, supported child care providers through NAEYC early learning accreditation, and met with federal Congressional representatives to advocate for public funding for child care during the pandemic.

Arizona AEYC board members contributed more than 325 volunteer service hours in 2022 participating in community events, leading professional development, and connecting with local educators and parents. This is equal to \$9,734 worth of in-kind donations.

The majority of our funded projects are implemented in collaboration with partner organizations to boost the impact for the early childhood profession.
